

## KARIN BURGER

**POSITIONS:** GK, GD, WD **DOB:** 12/04/1993 **HEIGHT:** 184cm **TEST CAPS:** 37 **DEBUT:** 15/09/2018 v England Roses

### Top-class defender Karin Burger gets the opportunity to contest her second Netball World Cup in 2023 after helping the Silver Ferns clinch the 2019 title.

One of five Silver Ferns backing up from 2019, Burger made her international debut in 2018 after setting consistently high standards at domestic level. Resilience and perseverance have paid off for the athletic and dogged defender after she made the bold decision to come to New Zealand from South Africa as an 18-year-old in 2012 to chase her Netball dream.

Burger made the change from in-circle defender to wing defence during the 2018 ANZ Premiership season with great success and can now play off both defensive wings with equal effect. Very quick off the mark, rangy and robust, Burger has continued to leave her mark in all facets of the game.

An impressive athlete, Burger has been a standout figure domestically in recent seasons through her consistently high standards, ability to make things happen and on-court tenacity. Being able to play all three defensive positions is another string to her bow.

Missing the Silver Ferns 2022 Commonwealth Games bronze medal run through injury, Burger will fulfil a dream when returning to her country of birth for the 2023 World Cup.





## GINA CRAMPTON #164

**POSITIONS:** WA, C **DOB**: 07/12/1991 **HEIGHT:** 174cm **TEST CAPS:** 63 **DEBUT:** 09/10/2016 v Australian Diamonds

After missing out on the 2018 Commonwealth Games team, slick midcourter Gina Crampton made a triumphant return in 2019 when the Silver Ferns went on to win the Netball World Cup in Liverpool.

To highlight her determined, motivated and tenacious spirit, Crampton came full circle when she was anointed the Silver Ferns 28th captain in 2021 and led the Silver Ferns to a bronze medal in Birmingham at the 2022 Commonwealth Games.

First coming to prominence in 2015, Crampton's vast experience has made her a cornerstone of the Silver Ferns attack line. She will line up for her second World Cup in South Africa in 2023.

Predominantly a wing attack but also an effective centre, the livewire midcourter showcases her skillsets through her speed, drive off the line and adept feeding ability while executing her well-performed attacking duties.

Making her international debut in 2016, Crampton has continued to build on her all-round abilities. Fit and fast on attack, Crampton is also an effective spoiler on defence. A fine all-round athlete, maturity and experience has added to Crampton's consistency, ability to find the gap and precision feeding which have been standout features at domestic level.



## AMELIARANNE EKENASIO #157

**POSITIONS:** GS, GA **DOB:** 11/01/1991 **HEIGHT:** 186cm **TEST CAPS:** 57 **DEBUT:** 08/10/2014 v Australian Diamonds

After 18 months out of international play following the birth of her second child, elegant shooter Ameliaranne Ekenasio made a successful return to the top flight while also reclaiming the captaincy for the 2022 Taini Jamison Trophy series against Jamaica.

A confident long-range shooter, Ekenasio was a key cog in the Silver Ferns 2019 World Cupwinning triumph and returns for the 2023 edition in South Africa as captain.

Born in Queensland but of Ngapuhi heritage, the stylish Ekenasio moved to New Zealand in 2014 after coming through the Australian system. She spent four years (2011-14) with the Queensland Firebirds but struggled for regular court time and was snapped up by the Central Pulse for the 2015 ANZ Championship.

More consistent game time paid dividends, a growing confidence resulting in impressive individual performances for the athletic shooter with the spectacular high-arching shot.

Able to play both shooting roles, Ekenasio is an excellent mover, with quick hands and feet, is good in the tight spaces and has an unwavering willingness to put the shots up from anywhere.

Just months after the birth of her first child, Ekenasio made her return to elite level netball with the FAST5 Ferns in late 2017.

A tall, agile and graceful athlete, Ekenasio gained her first selection to the Silver Ferns in 2014.





## MADDY GORDON

**POSITIONS:** C, WD, WA **DOB:** 16/01/2000 **HEIGHT:** 174cm **TEST CAPS:** 6 **DEBUT:** 03/03/2021 v Australian Diamonds

Building on her repertoire, rising young midcourter Maddy Gordon took her game to new levels in 2023 to clinch her spot in the Silver Ferns team for the World Cup in South Africa.

Making the move to Wellington from Auckland in her first year out of school in 2018, the livewire Gordon quickly found her niche in the Capital where she has gone on to forge an impressive career. A super quick and skilful midcourter with a non-stop engine, Gordon's all-round credentials enable her to slip comfortably between all three central court positions.

Spending a full season at centre along with a growing maturity and improved game structure to compliment her court craft, the midcourt dynamo produced a compelling 2023 domestic season. Accurate and consistent with her ball skills, movement and feeding on attack, Gordon is equally reliable on defence through her relentless disruptive hunting and speed.

Elevated to the Silver Ferns squad in 2020-21, Gordon has had a fleeting career at international level, missing selection in the 2022 Silver Ferns Commonwealth Games and 2023 Quad Series teams but in lifting her standards to new heights warranted a recall for Netball World Cup 2023.



## KATE HEFFERNAN #182

**POSITIONS:** WD, C, WA **DOB:** 07/10/1999 **HEIGHT:** 181cm **TEST CAPS:** 15 **DEBUT:** 29/07/2022 v Northern Ireland

Talented midcourter Kate Heffernan has taken little time to leave her imprint on the netball court, capping her rapid rise with selection in the Silver Ferns team for Netball World Cup 2023.

Already a White Ferns cricketer, Heffernan impressed enough during 2021 to earn selection in the Silver Ferns squad for the first time, quickly going on to make the cut for her first Commonwealth Games campaign in 2022 and will now attend her first World Cup.

Making a successful switch to centre after largely playing wing defence for the Steel, Heffernan has been an integral component of the Steel midcourt for five years where her game has continued to impress.

The midcourter made a seamless transition to the higher ranks of elite level domestic netball after being called up as an injury replacement in 2018 and hasn't looked back. Standing at 1.81m, Heffernan is tall for a midcourter, her long reach and athletic ability proving a disruptive influence as she has gone on to become an accomplished performer across two midcourt positions, both as an attacker and defender. She is the daughter of former Silver Fern Annette Heffernan.





KELLY JURY #166

POSITIONS: GK, GD DOB: 22/10/1996 HEIGHT: 192cm TEST CAPS: 46 DEBUT: 02/02/2017 v England Roses

### On the back of two standout domestic seasons, rangy defender Kelly Jury will attend her first World Cup in South Africa in 2023.

After a stellar 2022 season, Jury attended her second Commonwealth Games while going on to play a key role as the last line of defence in helping her team secure the bronze medal.

The towering 1.92m defender gained her first cap in 2017 ahead of playing an instrumental role in the NZ U21 team's unbeaten run to the World Youth Cup title the same year.

Major Achilles and shoulder injuries curtailed the early part of Jury's promising career but injuryfree in recent seasons has added confidence and a new lease of life. 2022 proved a breakout year for the willowy Jury, who thrived in her new leadership role at the Pulse while improved fitness and conditioning helping deliver a standout season.

As one of the tallest defenders in the New Zealand game, Jury has added to her skillset with quick hand and foot movement and attacking thrust from the back court while remaining a constant threat with her disruptive lean and rebounding ability. Improved positional awareness and tactical nous at the defensive end add another dimension to Jury's all-round abilities.



### PHOENIX KARAKA #155

**POSITIONS:** GK, GD **DOB:** 06/11/1993 **HEIGHT:** 186cm **TEST CAPS:** 50 **DEBUT:** 20/01/2014 v England Roses

Athletic defender Phoenix Karaka will attend her third World Cup in 2023 after also being part of the Silver Ferns title-winning 2019 and silver-winning 2015 events.

Karaka returned to the Silver Ferns for the Netball Quad Series in 2022 after time out for the birth of her daughter the previous year and subsequently lined up with the team in her first Commonwealth Games event the same year.

Having played for the Steel and Pulse before returning home to Auckland and the Mystics, experience has paid dividends for Karaka who made her Silver Ferns debut in 2014. Able to move comfortably between the two in-circle defensive positions, Karaka has a strong all-round skill set with her movement and ball handling ability while presents as a constant menace with her long reach and athletic ability.

Karaka has developed into a classy defender with her athleticism, tight marking, ability in the air and sense of awareness for the intercept.

Showing her versatility, athleticism and ability to adapt, Karaka was a key component in the midcourt for the FAST5 Ferns winning exploits during the 2016 FAST5 World Series.

Rising through the NZ U21 and NZSS teams, Karaka has built on a strong pedigree after being part of the 2013 World Youth Cup winning team.





## GRACE NWEKE

**POSITIONS:** GS **DOB:** 07/02/2002 **HEIGHT:** 193cm **TEST CAPS:** 21 **DEBUT:** 22/09/2021 v England Roses

### Born in New Zealand to Nigerian parents, towering shooter Grace Nweke, while still in her teens, became the first player of African descent to represent the Silver Ferns.

Nweke made a meteoric rise from schoolgirl status in 2019 when she was elevated from training partner to fulltime member of the Mystics playing squad in very quick succession. The 1.93m standout has continued to excel following a dominant 2021 season where she set a new ANZ Premiership scoring record, Nweke quickly grabbing the spotlight with her prowess under the hoop, temperament and athletic ability.

Bolstering her movement and strength in the air have added to the skillset of the richly talented shot-maker who is destined for a long elite level career. That was endorsed with first-time selection in the 2021-22 Silver Ferns squad while going on to make her international debut a few months later.

She played a key role in the Silver Ferns bronze medal-winning run at the 2022 Commonwealth Games and will make her Netball World Cup debut in 2023. An evolving player who stands poised to be one of the game's greats.



## TE PAEA SELBY-RICKIT #161

**POSITIONS:** GA, GS **DOB:** 14/01/1992 **HEIGHT:** 188cm **TEST CAPS:** 59 **DEBUT:** 27/08/2016 v England Roses

Just as she did for the Netball World Cup in 2019 and Commonwealth Games in 2022, lofty shooter Te Paea Selby-Rickit has timed her run perfectly to earn her place in the Silver Ferns for a second World Cup campaign, in South Africa, 2023.

After missing out on several in between Silver Ferns selections, Selby-Rickit has shown the capability to bounce back in impressive style. Able to play both shooting roles with equal effect have enhanced Selby-Rickit's credentials, her experience both domestically and internationally subsequently extending her repertoire and defining her play-making skills and decision-making.

After making her Silver Ferns debut in 2016, Selby-Rickit has become an influential leader in the Tactix attack line with her ability to direct play and set up the shooting circle.

Height, shooting nous and attacking smarts make Selby-Rickit a constant threat in the circle while her subtle court craft extends to clever off-loads and the ability to be a playmaker. She is also a confident and accurate mid-range shooting exponent. A strong mover while also having the ability to play a holding role make Selby-Rickit a dangerous shooting opponent.





### WHITNEY SOUNESS #167

POSITIONS: WA, C DOB: 12/10/1995 HEIGHT: 174cm TEST CAPS: 30 DEBUT: 26/08/2017 v SPAR Proteas

Long earmarked for a bright future, fleet-footed midcourter Whitney Souness will make her Netball World Cup debut in South Africa, in 2023.

Two sparkling domestic seasons in 2022 and 2023 have proved defining for Souness following her selection in the Silver Ferns 2022 Commonwealth Games and 2023 World Cup teams after a previously chequered career at international level.

A player of real quality and with growing confidence in leading an attack line, Souness has worked tirelessly to add consistency to her special skillset and was at her mercurial best in helping the Pulse to the ANZ Premiership Finals Series in 2022 and 2023.

The ever-present Souness has a strong repertoire. Speed off the mark, insightful feeding skills, change of direction off either foot, ability to off-load in the air and disruptive defensive work highlight Souness' abundant talent pool.

Making her debut in 2017, Souness has added consistency to her electric game which has continued to mature with age and experience. A key cog at domestic level, Souness has all the attributes to push on and now make her mark on the international stage.

A former NZ Secondary Schools player, Souness was also part of the World Series-winning FAST5 Ferns team of 2018.



### JANE WATSON #160

**POSITIONS:** GK, GD **DOB:** 07/03/1990 **HEIGHT:** 181cm **TEST CAPS:** 56 **DEBUT:** 27/08/2016 v England Roses

Part of the title-winning Silver Ferns at the 2019 Netball World Cup, dynamic defender Jane Watson is one of five returning players from that team to contest the 2023 edition in South Africa.

An integral figure throughout the 2019 World Cup campaign, the willowy defender missed the 2022 Commonwealth Games through pregnancy but made her impact felt when returning to domestic play with the Tactix in 2023.

Growing up playing football, Watson was a late starter to netball but her lean and athletic frame have conspired to make her a quality in-circle defender.

A stellar season for the Steel in 2016 resulted in selection to the Silver Ferns squad which turned into a late injury replacement call-up for the Netball Quad Series. Watson grabbed the opportunity with both hands to deliver an impressive series of games over the 2016 international season, her career blossoming ever since.

A dynamic vertical leap, long reach, speed off the mark and ability to hunt for ball outside the circle make Watson a dangerous and effective defender who has the knack of creating turnover ball at key moments.

Watson was the 2017 ANZ Premiership Player of the Year.





### MAIA WILSON #163

**POSITIONS:** GS **DOB:** 21/09/1997 **HEIGHT:** 187.5cm **TEST CAP:** 38 **DEBUT:** 14/09/2016 v Jamaica Sunshine Girls

Just missing selection in 2019, top quality shooter Maia Wilson will make her debut at the sport's pinnacle event at Netball World Cup 2023, in South Africa.

A precocious young talent, Wilson was a Silver Fern by the end of her debut season (2016) at the elite level at just 19 years of age and was a non-travelling reserve for the Silver Ferns 2019 World Cup campaign.

Having already played basketball for New Zealand when she joined the Pulse in her first year out of college in 2016, Wilson displayed the rich array of qualities that have taken her on a meteoric rise.

Blessed with an unflappable temperament, accuracy and strong netballing nous, Wilson has built on her repertoire through improved fitness and more exposure at the top level. A foundation member with the Stars and elevated as the youngest national league captain, the shooter has continued to refine her game and push to new levels with her ability to switch between a holding or moving game. She delivered her best season at domestic level in 2023, highlighted by increased volume and accuracy.

Wilson made her Commonwealth Games debut in 2022, and was a key performer in the NZ U21 team's World Youth Cup title win in 2017.



## SULU FITZPATRICK #149

**POSITIONS:** GK, GD, WD **DOB:** 20/08/1992 **HEIGHT:** 188cm **TEST CAPS:** 27 **DEBUT:** 03/10/2011 v England Roses

An immense figure in the game, strapping defender Sulu Fitzpatrick will be a travelling reserve for the Silver Ferns Netball World Cup 2023 campaign in South Africa, in what will be her swansong.

Seven years after playing a solitary test, strapping defender Fitzpatrick made a remarkable return to the Silver Ferns in 2018.

Continuing to impress with her imposing on-court presence both as a player and a leader, Fitzpatrick's standing was acknowledged when appointed Silver Ferns vice-captain in 2021, a position she retained for her first Commonwealth Games campaign in 2022.

After turning out for several different clubs in the intervening years, Fitzpatrick found her niche with the Pulse in 2018, returning from the international wilderness on the back of a storming season.

A strong presence in the defensive end, the powerhouse defender has an astute awareness and ability to direct play from the back, quick movement and a nose for the intercept. Returning to her home city of Auckland in 2020, Fitzpatrick's imposing form continued during a stellar season where she was at the forefront of a rejuvenated Mystics.

Fitzpatrick is a former NZ U21 captain and NZSS representative. Best known for her exploits from the custodian's position of goalkeeper, Fitzpatrick can cover all three defensive positions. Mobile and strong in the air, Fitzpatrick gained her solitary Test appearance against England in 2011 as a 19-year-old.





## TIANA METUARAU #178

Adding her customary infectious energy, Reuelu-Buchanan went on to make her senior international debut in impressive fashion against the SPAR Proteas during the series.

The fleet-footed Reuelu-Buchanan has cemented herself as a regular at the Stars since signing on in 2019, continuing to enhance her credentials following an impressive 2021 season which culminated with selection in the 2021/22 Silver Ferns Development squad.

Always in the thick of the action, Reuelu-Buchanan is a constant livewire on attack while improved defensive qualities have beefed up her all-round game, leading to her call-up to higher honours.

A member of the 2017 NZU21 World Youth Cup winning team, Reuelu-Buchanan offers a dynamic presence as an energetic, strong and tenacious player with a sparkling array of skills. Now a seasoned campaigner at the elite domestic level, there's no limits to Reuelu-Buchanan continuing her upward trend.





## NOELINE TAURUA #108

Head Coach

### On the back of an enviable record, the popular Noeline Taurua was installed as the 11th Silver Ferns coach in 2018 and wasted little time in leaving her mark.

In just 11 short months, the well-respected and affable Taurua completely transformed the Silver Ferns fortunes, from finishing out of the medals at the 2018 Commonwealth Games to world champions in 2019. It was the Silver Ferns first world title in 16 years. That received the highest recognition when she was named a Dame in the 2020 New Year Honours, just the third netballer to be awarded a Dame Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit [DNZM].

At home in the high performance environment, where she has a proven knack of getting the best out of her players, Taurua completed her outstanding 2019 World Cup campaign in Liverpool while juggling the dual roles of coaching the Silver Ferns and Sunshine Coast Lightning during 2018-19. In 2021, Taurua guided the Silver Ferns to a 3-1 series win over old rivals Australia to claim the Constellation Cup for the first time in nine years.

A mercurial goal attack, Taurua played in the 1995 World Cup and 1998 Commonwealth Games for the Silver Ferns before a knee injury ended her career. She quickly moved into coaching, working her way through the ranks while fashioning a stellar career at elite domestic level in both New Zealand and Australia. Taurua was an assistant coach for the Silver Ferns in 2011 and was the only coach to lead a New Zealand side to an ANZ Championship title, having overseen the Waikato Bay of Plenty Magic's win in 2012. She took over the Southern Steel in 2016, claiming the former trans-Tasman Netball League Minor Premiership in her first campaign with an unbeaten record in the regular season. With a Masters of Science in performance coaching, Taurua has tasted success on both sides of the Tasman. Plying her trade in Australia during 2017 -2019, Taurua made a sensational impact when leading new team Sunshine Coast Lightning to back-to-back premierships.



## DEBBIE FULLER #109

Assistant Coach

Deb Fuller was appointed Silver Ferns assistant coach to Noeline Taurua in September 2018, ahead of the end-of-season international programme and the pair's introduction to the world stage.

Fuller has had extensive coaching experience at the elite domestic level, during the former trans-Tasman league, during which she was assistant coach with the Northern Mystics in 2009 and 2010 before taking over the head coach's role for four years, in 2011 and 2012, and 2014 and 2015.

The former Silver Fern was also appointed coach of the FAST5 Ferns in 2018, Fuller continuing New Zealand's rich legacy in the shortened version of the game after guiding the team to the Netball World Series title for a seventh time, in Melbourne. Before taking over the assistant coach's role with the Silver Ferns, the Mount Maunganui-domiciled Fuller worked with Waikato Bay of Plenty in a high performance capacity.
