This Annual Report and these Financial Statements will be presented at the 88th Council Meeting of Netball New Zealand to be held in Christchurch on 28 February 2015.

From the Board Chair and Chief Executive Officer

After a full and productive year we are pleased to present to you Netball New Zealand's 2014 Annual Report. There were a number of notable achievements and we gained forward momentum with planning and identifying challenges to address.

The strategic leadership focus developed by the Netball New Zealand Board in 2013 remains valid and provides important context for the stage we are at in the development of the Netball system and new organisation structure for the sport.

Highlights from 2014 include:

New National Junior Netball Programme - We are delighted with the success of this new programme which was introduced nationally in 2014 and offered to all Netball Centres in New Zealand after two years of trials. This resulted in unprecedented growth in junior player numbers of eight per cent (almost 5,000) more children playing Netball in 2014. The new modified game continues to be rolled out throughout New Zealand with new modules being introduced for Year 3 &

4 children in 2015, and older age groups in subsequent years. We believe this is just the beginning and the perfect platform to introduce children to Netball and build a lifelong love of the game. This is the first significant increase in player numbers for some years and the Community Netball team at NNZ, Zones and Centres are to be congratulated for their hard work in making this programme such a success.

Affiliated Membership - Along with growth in junior player numbers, greater transparency and accuracy of reporting of player numbers saw an increase in affiliated players to 148,312. Excluding social players, we had a four per cent increase in membership. This continues to see us as the largest women's team sport in New Zealand by some considerable margin, and second only to rugby. It is so important that we are able to accurately report on our participation levels, to all stakeholders.

High Performance Player and Coach Development -

Although 2014 was a year of mixed results on the court, the hard work going on behind the scenes is heartening. We committed to undertaking two major reviews in player development and high performance coach development which identified the need for sustained investment in system development in these areas. To maintain a world class high performance system it's imperative we continue to invest in building depth in New Zealand.

The National Player Development Review helped to clarify the roles of Zones and Centres in developing talented players, and NNZ's role in providing national direction, policy and programmes. As a result of the review, NNZ has refocused its talent development resources on the formation of a National Development Squad absorbing the NZU21, Accelerant Squad and NZA team selections. The first of these selections resulted in a successful match against England during their tour to New Zealand in October

The second major review was to assess the elite coaching talent we have in our country. Our high performance coaches need sustained development and support if they are to fulfil their potential. The outcomes from the review resulted in the development of NNZ's High Performance Coach Programme which launched in December with 13 of our top coaches



We would like to acknowledge and thank High Performance Sport New Zealand, in particular Eddie Kohlase for their assistance with these reviews.

Coach and Officials Development – The development and launch of Performance Coach added another strong thread to Netball New Zealand's National Coach Development Framework. To date 98 coaches have been accepted onto Performance Coach, an award which takes two-three years to attain. Overall, 6,000 coaches throughout New Zealand attended coaching courses this year. Highlights from officiating included the ongoing implementation of the umpire coach and assessor accreditation system, which now has 300 accredited umpire coaches across New Zealand and will continue to increase in 2015.

Silver Ferns Programme – 2014 was a pinnacle event year with the Glasgow Commonwealth Games at which the Silver Ferns fell short of the gold medal in the wake of an injury ridden campaign. Under significant pressure throughout the event, the team pulled together under the leadership of Waimarama Taumaunu and Vicki Wilson and captaincy of Casey Kopua, to win the silver medal.

The year started well with a successful tour of the UK in January with the Silver Ferns winning matches against Scotland, England, Jamaica and England A.

It was a disappointing New World Netball Series with the loss of the Constellation Cup to Australia however the team retained the Taini Jamison Trophy against England in a tightly fought series, with the Silver Ferns narrowly winning on goal difference.

A comprehensive summary of the year included a thorough review of the team's performance at the Commonwealth Games which identified key areas of the Silver Ferns programme to work on. The focus is now firmly on rebuilding depth into the wider Silver Ferns squad to ensure ongoing success into the future.

Special mention must go to Irene van Dyk who made the tough decision to hang up her dress on the international stage prior to the Commonwealth Games. What she has given to Netball both on and off the court cannot be expressed with enough superlatives and we wish her all the very best for her future.

New Zealand Secondary Schools (NZSS) team – One of the success stories of 2014 was the NZSS team retaining the International Schoolgirls Netball Challenge trophy in Adelaide. Coach Marianne Delaney-Hoshek, assisted by Julie Seymour are to be congratulated for their efforts which saw the team remain unbeaten through the tournament.

FAST5 Netball World Series - The FAST5 Ferns retaining the FAST5 Netball World Series trophy was a fantastic way to wrap up the international season. Congratulations to coach Janine Southby on guiding the FAST5 Ferns to their third consecutive FAST5 Netball World Series win. The third year of hosting this memorable event at Auckland's Vector Arena brought together the learning from previous years. In a cauldron of Netball fandom, the six international teams played highly entertaining Netball with the audience dressed in costume and becoming part of the event. The result was an inspiring and eclectic mix of Netball, music and entertainment. Thanks must go to the International Netball Federation and President Molly Rhone for entrusting us with the FAST5 Netball World Series for the past three years. The 2014 event demonstrated its commercial potential and future viability, encouraging NNZ to consider future hosting.

ANZ Championship – Concluding its seventh year, though relatively "young" compared to other international sporting competitions, the ANZ Championship continues to evolve and cement itself as the best Netball league in the world. NNZ strongly values our partnership with Netball Australia and the leauge. While it was fantastic to see Kia Waikato Bay of Plenty Magic reach the Finals Series, the New Zealand teams are not yet performing at a consistently high enough level, and there is further opportunity to develop their programmes within the Zones. We are excited about the new conference systems format being introduced in 2015 along with the new Challenge Trophy initiative. We would also like to acknowledge the great work of the TTNL Board members, with particular thanks to Board Chair Pam Smith and our New Zealand directors Shirley Hooper and our NNZ independent Board member Shane Harmon.

National Tournaments – We are proud to have delivered five successful national tournaments around the country in 2014 including three age group championships; NZU17's, NZU19's, NZU23's as well as the NZ Secondary Schools Netball Championship and the Lion Foundation Netball Champs. These events are always run superbly by our capable team here at NNZ in conjunction with the Netball Zones and Centres, and highlight the talented coaches and players coming through our pathways.

Zone Development – Concluding their second year of operation, NNZ is pleased with the quality of governance, leadership and development of the five Netball Zones which operate in a highly challenging environment. The importance and role of the Zones in the development of Netball, player, coach, and official, and high performance was further clarified during 2014. Considerable investment has

been made in developing the working relationship between the Zones and NNZ, and we are continuing to make good progress integrating our processes to ensure consistent delivery of Netball throughout New Zealand at all levels.

Financial sustainability and resourcing of the Zones remains challenging, though we were encouraged by some growth in commercial support of the Zones towards the end of the year. NNZ is further developing the provision of shared services to the Zones, and have established a Transitional Partnership Agreement with each Zone to clarify our respective obligations during 2014 and 2015. NNZ is committed to providing additional funding support to assist the Zones in return for Zone support with the implementation of national programmes.

Sport New Zealand's investment enabled the Jane Huria Governance Project to assist Zones and Centres further develop their governance capability and this opportunity has been taken up by all Zones, with many Centres also participating in workshops and training. The vision and commitment of all five Zones continues to impress us and we would like to acknowledge and thank the Zone Boards for their hard work and support during this challenging establishment phase. We specifically thank each of the Zone Board Chairs and NNZ appointed Zone Board representatives and CEO's.

Centres – Netball Centres continue to be the lifeblood of our sport, with the incredible network of volunteers and facilities, meeting the needs of our playing, coaching and officiating community week in and week out. With the formation of Mercury Bay Netball Centre in the Coromandel, the number of Centres is currently 85.

Netball's Heritage Project and Brand – Gathering stories and history from NNZ Life Members, building the past Silver Ferns database and bringing together the 1987 Silver Ferns to farewell the 2014 Silver Ferns to Glasgow for the Commonwealth Games were just a few of the highlights of the Heritage Project in 2014. In addition, we have undertaken a significant piece of work developing Netball's brand positioning and framework which will be implemented in 2015.

Whole of Netball Plan – A priority for NNZ during 2014 was to create a plan or national agenda for the development of Netball throughout New Zealand for the next five years. The plan is close to being finalised following extensive input from Centres, Zones and other key Netball partners, with the priority initiatives becoming clear. The plan will transparently



guide NNZ's priorities and allocation of resources to projects of national significance, to ensure we are investing in the development of the game and a strong sustainable system.

The plan will be launched at the 2015 Netball New Zealand AGM.

Netball New Zealand Organisation – With the appointment of a new CEO and the Zone structure firmly in place, it was appropriate that NNZ undergo its own organisation review, to determine the capacity and capability to enable NNZ to perform its roles as a national sporting organisation, a shared services provider to the Zones, meet international commitments and deliver the ANZ Championship in New Zealand. Excluding the divulging of the Coach Development function [CoachForce] to the Zones, the redesigned organisation resulted largely in a reallocation of existing resources to strengthen capabilities in key areas. The focus was particularly in high performance and the commercial function, with additional resourcing for shared services provision. Recruitment for new positions is nearly complete, and the team will be in place for 2015.

Financial Result – NNZ achieved a pleasing group operating surplus of \$198K.

Our Sincere Thanks – A special thank you must go to our partners who provide such great support for our programmes and initiatives. In particular, we sincerely thank our elite sponsor New World, media partners SKY Sport and NZME. Our national sponsors include Holden, ANZ, The Hits, Pita Pit, House of Travel, Canterbury of New Zealand and Yahoo! New Zealand; we are grateful for their support.

Our relationship with Sport New Zealand and High
Performance Sport New Zealand remains strong and we are
hugely grateful for their support of community sport, high
performance and capability development. Long standing
relationships with The Lion Foundation for the delivery
of national tournaments, and New Zealand Community
Trust with our national CoachForce Programme and Coach
Development are hugely valued.

We'd like to acknowledge NNZ President Sheryl, Lady Wells as her four-year term in the role comes to a close in early 2015. She has been an outstanding ambassador and contributor to Netball in many different guises over the years and we are going to sincerely miss her at NNZ, but know that in her generous and understated manner, she will continue to be a strong contributor to the game.

Changes to the NNZ Board in 2014 – Chair Raewyn Lovett's term as NNZ Board Chair came to an end in May, replaced by Board member John Bongard, while two new faces took their

seats at the Board table and we were delighted to welcome Debbie Hodges (elected) and Allison Ferguson (appointed). We would also like the acknowledge the exemplary contribution of Carole Maddix who has added immeasurably to the NNZ Board over many years.

We'd like to thank the NNZ Board, the dedicated staff here at NNZ, staff and volunteers in the Netball Zones and Netball Centres who work so hard to deliver our sport.

In conclusion, we are pleased with what has been a productive and busy year.

It's a pleasure to be journeying with you all and we are looking forward to an action packed and successful 2015.

Irene van Dyk – A Tribute

Silver Ferns 145 Test Caps 2000-2014

Positions - GS, GA Height: 190 cm DOB: 21 June 1972

Ageless super-shooter Irene van Dyk rewrote the Netball record books with her incredible abilities during a remarkable 20-year international career. After accumulating 72 test caps for her native South Africa, the long-limbed shooter made New Zealand her home in 2000. from where she launched a dazzling career.

Van Dyk showed a total disregard for any previous longstanding milestones as she continued to set new standards. She became the world's most capped Netballer in 2005, achieved her 200th test cap in 2011 and, by retirement in 2014, had notched the seemingly unsurpassable total of 217.

The ever-smiling van Dyk chalked up an enviable international record, competing at five Netball World Championships – two

for South Africa and three for New Zealand - winning one Netball World Championship title and two Commonwealth Games gold medals with the Silver Ferns.

Sure hands, perfect positioning under the hoop and uncanny accuracy, where she rarely shot under 90 per cent, were the hallmarks of this super-talented player. Selfless in her actions, van Dyk is the consummate professional.

Arguably the world's greatest Netballer of all time, Irene van Dyk has set the standard for future generations.



In just the second year of operation under the new Zone structure, we are now starting to see positive signs and momentum going forward.

Significant progress has been made in a relatively short time span through working collaboratively with our Centres and volunteers to offer participation opportunities across the Mainland Zone.

The Tactix team is continuing to build a solid foundation for the future and the inclusion of our Zone players, umpires and coaches in NNZ squads is heartening. The Christchurch Netball Centre team won the Lion Foundation Netball Champs in Auckland and we saw the introduction of the Netball Mainland Emerging Talent programme.

Netball Mainland school teams won all three grades at the South Island Secondary Schools tournament and the St Margaret's College team was runner-up at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Netball Championships. We have seen 90 new Community Coach Award holders and more than 500 junior coaches/coordinators/star helpers join our coaching ranks as well as the introduction of an Apprentice Coach programme.








Player Participation


















The second major project was the High Performance Coach Development Review which was aimed at making sure our top-quality coaches in New Zealand are provided with effective development support. A small number of coaches were selected to be part of this innovative and intensive programme.

As Netball is one of the most high-profile, high-participation sports in New Zealand, NNZ is committed to continuing to grow the sport at all levels. We look forward to enhancing these important relationships further with Sport NZ and HPSNZ, with positive outcomes for all.





Community Netball

Under the Community Netball umbrella, a definitive focus and key area in 2014 was placed around Junior Netball and it is exciting to report an 11 per cent growth in membership this year.

The new national Junior Netball programme, which has been designed around modified games and skill and coach development, ensured lots of resources were delivered out into the Netball Centres.

Phase one of the programme was rolled out in 2014. Netball New Zealand had an initial target of 40 Netball Centres participating, and there was an overwhelmingly positive response when 70 of the 86 picked up the Year 1 & 2 programme.

The feedback from parents and Centres has been very positive while the Zones have been fully supportive in coordinating the programme and helping the Centres with delivery.

We would like to acknowledge the Zones and the five Community Netball Managers, with whom NNZ has worked in close partnership, and who have been hugely supportive in helping to roll out this new programme throughout the country.

In another huge success, 1,200 new coaches, many being secondary school students and parents, came through the new Junior Netball coach development modules and

In terms of umpiring in Community Netball, we've retained a focus on the Coach and Assessor Training [CAT] workshops. Introductory, Level 1 and Update workshops were run in 2014 with the emphasis on training umpire coaches and assessors to help increase the quality and support of our umpires.

There has been a strong response to this programme, which is into its third year, and we now have umpire coaches in most Centres around the country. We will continue to focus on this area in 2015.

The successful Outreach Programme continued in 2014.

This is an initiative designed to go into smaller areas of the country; this year, it ventured to the five Netball Centres in Waiuku, Gisborne, Taranaki, Motueka and Wakatipu.

Included on these visits were workshops centred on coaches and umpires working more effectively, helping Centres connect with their communities and on delivering the core NetballSmart messages.

Another project was we have conducting some research around secondary school Netball which looked at motivations for teenage girls in Netball. This will assist with the development of new programmes for targeting this core group of players.

The New Zealand Secondary Schools Sports Council (NZSSC) 2013 census revealed that Netball is the most-played sport at secondary school level, so research into this key participant area is important.



Coach Development

CoachForce, this year, worked on a relaunch and refresher of the Coach Development framework, which has now identified four clear levels - Foundation, Community, Performance and High Performance.

The CoachForce team, continued the development of coaches throughout New Zealand and supporting the Coach Development Framework.

The team consisted of Robin Manihera (Netball Northern), Dale Atkinson (Netball Waikato Bay of Plenty), Lindsay Filiata (Netball Central), Jennie Hooper (Netball Mainland) and Noeline Scott (Netball South).

This year's National Road Show focused on 'Coaching with Confidence' and was delivered by Janine Southby, current Southern Steel and FAST5 Ferns coach and former NZU21 coach.

The popular Janine Southby took the road show to all five Netball Zones, the reception from each producing impressive turnouts. The focus on how we can support secondary school coaches better ensured that large numbers of coaches from that key area took part.

In terms of Junior Netball, one of the coaching priorities has been the redevelopment of coaching workshops to align with the new Junior Netball programme. That has meant targeted workshops for Star Helpers, Junior Coordinators and Year 384 coaches, which were all launched

The Performance Coach Award was relaunched this year and three of the five new advanced coaching modules have been released - Skill Acquisition, Mental Skills and Enhanced Performance. Performance Coach is designed to align with the National Player Development plan and support coaches

working with our talented players.

Another success this year was the Apprentice Coach programme where 12 identified talented coaches from across the country worked with the Lion Foundation teams at the national championships

It's an intensive week for the apprentice coaches with lots of external presentations as well as times of working alongside the team. They are, therefore, in a real-life coaching environment but also are receiving personal development opportunities.

These are the coaches that, we hope, will become the next Lion Foundation coaches and, ideally, beyond that, ANZ Championship and Silver Ferns coaches of the future.

NNZ is hugely grateful for its support of Netball in New Zealand, through the funding of the nation wide coach development programme and CoachForce.

NetballSmart

Thousands of Netballers have access to NetballSmart across all Zones with resources being distributed nationwide to Centres throughout the year.

With the invaluable support of Accident Compensation Corporation (ACC), the NetballSmart programme continues to educate on the benefits of performance enhancement and injury prevention, supported by coach, player and umpire resource development.

With a growing demand from players, coaches and umpires to maximise performance and lessen injury rates, workshops and sessions remain ongoing features of the NetballSmart programme. NetballSmart was an important part of this year's Outreach Programme and delivered sessions to coaches and umpires on the importance of core stability and demonstrated effective warm-up and cool-down sessions, which coaches can deliver with their own players.

These initiatives continue to draw growing numbers, with more NetballSmart facilitators helping to deliver the programme while merging it with Netball New Zealand's MyNetball website, where users can download all NetballSmart resources free of charge, proving invaluable.

Research remains an important focus of NetballSmart as it ensures the programme remains up to date and the best information and advice is passed on to the Netball community.









High Performance

Netball New Zealand retains its high profile both nationally and internationally, thanks to the support of Sport New Zealand and High Performance Sport New Zealand and to the Silver Ferns retaining their number-two ranking in the world.

Two major reviews were undertaken in 2014, the results of which underpin the high performance space into the future at both player and coaching levels. The newly developed High Performance Coach Development Programme is a new initiative developed to ensure elite coaches are receiving the support and ongoing development needed to ensure sustainability and longevity.

Each coach will have their own personal development plan and mentoring, assistance with leadership development and formulation of winning strategies. They will gain the opportunity for cross-sport experience whilst having access to the Silver Ferns and ANZ Championship environments.

Looking forward, NNZ will provide more support to New Zealand coaches within the High Performance Coaching framework that covers both theory and practical application of coaching in the high performance environment.

The second major review resulted in developing NNZ's recently adopted National Player Development Plan, outlining a clear pathway for improving player development in New Zealand, aligned with the new Zone governance, administration and delivery structures.

One of the immediate impacts was the realignment of the national squads in New Zealand: Silver Ferns, New Zealand A (NZA) and the newly introduced National Development Squad. While the Silver Ferns Squad framework remains the same, the NZA team has been re-established to ensure the next tier of Silver Ferns is engaged in the high performance programme and given opportunities to continue to develop.

The key event over the year for the Silver Ferns was the 2014 Glasgow Commonwealth Games, in which they finished with a Silver medal. In November, NZA played England and was victorious, awarding players vital experience playing against the third-ranked team in the world.

October was a busy month for the Silver Ferns with six test matches; four against the Australian Diamonds for the Constellation Cup and the two-match series for the Taini Jamison trophy. The National Development Squad replaces the National Accelerant Squad and NZU21 Squads and is separated into two tiers - an Accelerant tier and an Under 21 tier. These two tiers are for players who are on the player pathway to higher honours.

A special mention must be made of HPSNZ's Eddie Kohlase who has been instrumental in forming these two reviews, with positive outcomes resulting almost immediately.

It would be amiss not to mention the talented group of support staff at the high performance level throughout the country including managers, strength and conditioning experts, nutritionists, video analysts and physiotherapists, who together do an amazing job of keeping our top athletes in peak form through Age Group events, Zone-level competitions and the ANZ Championship.



Events and International

Age Group Nationals

This year, a combined team from the State Institute of Sport and State Academies of Sport (SISSAS) programme, which is run across various states in Australia, was selected to come to our national U23 tournament. The team was coached by former Australian captain Michelle den Dekker and new Tactix coach Sue Hawkins.

It proved to be a great addition to the competition and the team enjoyed the opportunity to be part of the new rules trials which were incorporated into this event.

The combined Australian team joined the five Netball Zone teams to make the event a six-strong competition, providing the opportunity for all teams to trial four rules under current discussion. For the New Zealand players, at a critical stage of their development, it also offered great exposure and a valuable opportunity to play against the Australian style.

Rules Trials

The rules trials in place at the U19 and U23 tournaments were, by and large, very well received. The rules affected were: two-point goals; no whistle sounded after a goal was scored; stoppages kept to 30 seconds; and only one foot was required in the centre circle for the centre pass-off.

The international body's Rules Advisory Panel is now in the process of finalising proposals to go to the International Netball Federation (INF) Congress, before the Netball World Cup in August 2015.

Record numbers attended this year's national U17 tournament held at North Harbour with 39 teams taking part: surpassing previous records since its inception as a national event in 2009. The addition of the U23 event to the calendar in recent years has resulted in higher-quality matches and competitions in the U17 and U19 age groups.

Live streaming was introduced at this level for the first time and was very well received at the U17 event.

New World Netball Series Constellation Cup & Taini Jamison Trophy

After four years, Netball returned to the newly rebuilt

ILT Stadium Southland for the first test of the New World Netball Series for the Constellation Cup. The game was very well supported by the wider Southland sporting public.

It was wonderful to be able to take our three remaining home test matches to The Trusts Arena in Waitakere, Energy Events Centre in Rotorua and Palmerston North's Arena Manawatu where the Silver Ferns are always warmly embraced.

ANZ Championship

In the ANZ Championship, games were taken to the Saxton Stadium in Nelson for the first time.

One of the consequences of the earthquakes in Canterbury has been that Mainland has had to become quite creative around the hosting of its home matches for the Tactix in the ANZ Championship. That has resulted in Nelson being involved and, in 2015, that practice will extend to Blenheim.

The Nelson District Council was an enthusiastic participant in encouraging ANZ Championship Netball into their city as the Tactix broke new ground in opening up other options for where league matches are held.

FAST5 Netball World Series

Hosted in Auckland, the third year of the FAST5 Netball World Series proved the biggest and brightest yet with the event fully embraced by the public.

Host broadcaster SKY Sport covered every match live on SKY Sport 5: an indication of how strongly the event is viewed by one of our key partners. Following on from last year's success and the popularity of the event globally, matches were broadcast to Australia, South Africa, England and the Caribbean.

In the final year of a three-year contract to host the event, New Zealand can be proud of how it has created this version of the shortened format, initiated and developed the event and demonstrated that there is an appetite and place for FAST5 within the Netball world.

The objective of 'sportainment' has well and truly been achieved. That other sporting codes have visited and viewed our product and what we've done is a real compliment.



The FAST5 Ferns team continued its stunning success in the shortened version of the game when sealing a third successive FAST5 Netball World Series title at Vector Arena in November.

FAST5 has continued to capture a growing audience while being fully embraced by the players as an entertaining yet highly skilled exhibition of Netballing talent; the 2014 edition did not disappoint.

In the final of its three-year contract of hosting the event, Auckland turned on the razzle-dazzle, the energetic and colourfully dressed crowds adding to the occasion as the top six international teams in the world put on a show to remember

From the time they went on sale, tickets flew out the door, and the FAST5 Ferns went on to complete the remarkable record of remaining unbeaten in the three years of the FAST5 Netball World Series.

In 2014, the FAST5 Netball World Series was moved from the previous three-day format to a two-day event, altering the draw slightly and, as a result, making it slightly more cutthroat for the teams.

The loss of established players Maria Tutaia, Casey Kopua and Irene van Dyk ahead of the tournament posed a question mark of just how an untried and young FAST5 Ferns team

With its natural affinity and technical ability easily adapted to the FAST5 concept, the home team excelled during the tournament, in the process unveiling a clutch of new stars in the form of Temalisi Fakahokotau, Kayla Cullen, Bailey Mes, Grace Rasmussen, Malia Paseka and Jamie-Lee Price who ensured that the FAST5 Ferns rich tradition was retained.

Laura Langman, the player of the tournament, and Katrina Grant, both excelled during the event and ensured the FAST5 Ferns remained the benchmark in this form of the game.

And, with it, they presented Irene van Dyk a fitting farewell when posting a 35-31 win over the Australian FAST5 Flyers in the Grand Final, a rematch of last year's final.

Having to withdraw from her swansong event with a back injury on the eve of the tournament, the recently retired van Dyk was chaired into the stadium as the FAST5 Ferns, Australia, England and the boisterous crowd paid homage to the great shooter ahead of the final.

ANZ Championship Overview



The ANZ Championship enhanced its credentials as the world's premier Netball league, both on and off the court, as 2014 delivered its most unpredictable edition yet.

Celebrating its seventh year, the trans-Tasman league continued to hit new levels; the fitness, skill, athleticism and flair delivered by the players was matched by a growing number of spectators thirsting to view the action.

Throwing up more surprise results than have occurred in previous years ensured a riveting spectacle and eagerly anticipated match-ups throughout the 14-week regular season and certainly drew the crowds.

With all 69 matches shown live across SKY Sport in New Zealand and FOX Sports in Australia, viewing audiences remained strong while 2014 also produced a match attendance record.

This year, more fans and followers attended the ANZ Championship than ever before with Round 12 breaking the record for the largest crowd during a single regular-season round, despite one fewer match being played than during the previous record round in 2009.

Mainstream and social media also clamoured to be part of the action, all facets of the competition receiving increased interest and coverage from a wide range of mediums during 2014.

Plenty of player movement in the off-season produced a more even spread across this year's teams, particularly in the five New Zealand franchises, and resulted in a closer competition and a greater likelihood of upsets.

And that is exactly what eventuated when the order of the teams to contest the Finals Series was not established

until the penultimate match of the final round of the regular season. Depending on results, all of the top four teams heading into the final round had a chance to finish as the Minor Premiers.

This was a first for the competition and, not for the first time during the season, an unlikely string of late results caused some dramatic reshuffling of final positions in a tense and eagerly anticipated run to the play-offs.

It was a mixed bag for the New Zealand teams where underdogs Kia Waikato Bay of Plenty Magic shone brightest while the highly fancied Haier Pulse and Northern Mystics fell short of expectations, given the calibre of players in both sides.

Magic broke new ground this year when Julie Fitzgerald became the first Australian to coach a New Zealand team in the league. But with nine personnel changes and the loss of key players, Magic was largely written off ahead of this year's campaign.

However, the experienced Julie Fitzgerald and inspiring captain Casey Kopua wholeheartedly embraced the challenge of moulding a new-look Magic into a highly competitive unit.

The team's fighting spirit and growing self-belief were standouts as they continued to exceed expectations in maintaining Magic's fine record. A battling four-goal loss to the Queensland Firebirds in the Preliminary Final sealed a highly credible third-place finish for the Waikato Bay of Plenty team and its seventh successive Finals Series: the only team to achieve this feat.



Ascot Park Hotel Southern Steel was the next best of the New Zealand teams but were left to lament a slow start to the season which ultimately cost them a place in the top four. Hitting their straps late in the piece, the southerners showed their worth with a productive late-season burst to seal fifth place.

There was, however, plenty to be encouraged about for the future with the team's wealth of young talent across all areas of the court making strong impressions.

The Pulse finished sixth on the major league table. In general, the team from the capital played well against its compatriots but, with 10 current or former internationals on its roster, could not find a way to win the Australian contests.

The equally talented Northern Mystics were seen as a leading force also ahead of this year's competition but losing four of its first five matches put it on the back foot early.

Stylish wins over the West Coast Fever and NSW Swifts to end the team's season highlighted what might have been in an otherwise fruitless campaign in finishing seventh. However, one shining light was the emergence of rookie defender Temalisi Fakahokotau who was an individual standout.

The Mainland Tactix propped up the bottom of the table but played better than its position reflects. With the exciting addition of Malawi shooter Mwai Kumwenda lighting up its attacking end, the Tactix played with flair and innovation. It pushed other teams closely on many occasions, showing continued improvement throughout the season.

Coach Leigh Gibbs ended her tenure with Tactix at the end of the season, after three years at the helm, but has left a strong foundation of youthful talent well prepared to take the next step up.

Players lining up for New Zealand teams featured strongly in the end-of-season awards with Magic's England import Jo Harten being named joint MVP with Swifts midcourter and captain Kim Green. In her first season with Magic after moving north from the Tactix, the lofty shooter with the unflappable temperament was a model of consistency and accuracy in playing her part in the team's success this year. Instrumental in helping steer Magic to the Preliminary Final, the successful Fitzgerald/Kopua partnership was duly rewarded when Kopua was the only New Zealander to make the public-voted All Stars team, at goal defence, with Fitzgerald as its coach.

The Steel's towering Jhaniele Fowler-Reid was named goal shoot in the All Stars team for a second successive year, the Jamaican import becoming the player to score 1,000 goals in the shortest time in the competition.

Kumwenda capped an outstanding debut season when named the Best New Talent for 2014.

The first Malawian to play in the ANZ Championship, Kumwenda's unique style, flair, aerial skills and athleticism made her an instant hit with all involved. She was the leading scorer in the league with 540 goals at 91.4 percent accuracy.





Oceania **Netball Federation**

The focus over the past two years in Oceania has been on umpire development. There have been some very positive outcomes from this focus; however, there remains a challenge in maintaining the level of consistent matches for the ongoing development and progression of umpires towards attaining higher honours.

There has been some encouraging progress in the umpiring space in the region:

- Zone/Oceania Theory passes 2014: 21 from 37 candidates
- New Zealand Theory passes 2014: 0 from 1 candidate
- Zone/Oceania Theory passes 2013: 5 from 12 candidates
- New Zealand Theory passes 2013: 4 from 4 candidates
- Fiji's Jona Saturu and Luci Matenga from the Cook Islands are the top-ranked umpires in the region. Both were invited to the National Umpire Squads workshop in New Zealand in December and both umpires have NZB Awards.

Annual General Meeting (AGM)

In June, the Oceania Netball Federation held its AGM in the Cook Islands alongside the hosting of the Pacific Netball Series and the Netball World Cup qualifying event.

The AGM was well attended and there was good discussion on a number of topics throughout the time shared together. Finance continues to be a challenging area with the withdrawal and cessation of the PNP funding, leaving several Oceania countries with half-completed projects and no ability to maintain and/or develop them further.

The Netball World Cup qualifying event was well contested;

however, Fiji was quite dominant in the end, winning the event and the first qualifying position for the Netball World Cup in 2015. Samoa came second while Papua New Guinea [PNG] and the Cook Islands were also competitive.

The Pacific Games will be held in 2015 in Papua New Guinea and under INF eligibility regulations for the first time ever, Oceania Netball Federation (ONF) is looking forward to a wellcontested Netball competition. The 2015 Oceania Netball Series has been announced, this will be the first time the Silver Ferns have ever played an international test series in Fiji. There will also be a focus on development programmes, for coaching and bench officials. The coaching area has been identified by several countries as important as they seek to prepare their Under 21 teams for the next World Youth Netball Championships.

Bench officials, too, are seen as a key area as the countries seek to ensure delivery of their events is equal to the best in the world. This area of the game is one where all countries can excel, regardless of their playing strength.

Development programmes to support both of these will be implemented in early 2015 with longer-term development planned if these next initiatives are successful.



Associate Members: New Zealand Men's & **Mixed Netball Association**

The New Zealand Men's & Mixed Nethall Association enjoyed another great year in 2014, highlighted by the Mixed National Tournament held in Auckland in April and the National Men's competition, which celebrated its 30th anniversary in Rotorua in September.

The Mixed National Tournament was hosted at the Auckland Netball Centre with 12 teams from Netball Northern and two from Canterbury competing in the annual tournament. It's hoped that more teams from around the country will enter

The National Men's Tournament was as hotly contested as it always is in Rotorua in September with North Harbour defeating Canterbury A in the final for the first time.

Independent **Auditor's Report**

To the members of Netball New Zealand Incorporated Report on the incorporated society and group financial statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Netball New Zealand Incorporated ("the incorporated society") and the group, comprising the incorporated society and its joint venture interest, on pages 130 to 134. These matters have not impaired our independence as auditor of the incorporated society and group. The firm has no other relationship with, or interest in, the incorporated society and group.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 30 November 2014

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Reporting

Netball New Zealand Incorporated (NNZ) is an Incorporated Society in New Zealand. NNZ is a Public Benefit Entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with NZ GAAP and s23[i] of the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

NNZ is not publicly accountable and is not large as defined by NZICA Framework for Differential Reporting.

The Incorporation has claimed the following reporting exemptions:

(a) FRS10 Statement of Cashflows

(b) FRS3 Accounting for Property, Plant & Equipment

These financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost with the exception of certain items which are detailed below.

Financial reporting changes

The External Reporting Board of New Zealand ("XRB") has released a new accounting standards framework effective 1 April 2014. Netball New Zealand are currently reporting under old NZ GAAP. Under the new XRB framework management expect they will prepare Special purpose financial statements.

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going-concern basis.

Goods & Services Tax

Figures shown in these financial statements are exclusive of GST, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable.

Revenue Recognition

The revenue from Sponsorship contracts is allocated over the term of the contract. Where the Sponsorship relates to a specific event the revenue is recognised when the event occurs. The revenue from Grants that are project specific is recognised when the project occurs.

Contro

Contra received is recognised as Sponsorship revenue when amounts are quantifiable in terms of the Sponsorship contract.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable are shown at an amount which represents their estimated realisable value.

Investments

Investments have been valued at market value as at 30 November 2014. They have been recognised through a revaluation reserve

Plant, Equipment and Depreciation

Plant and Equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Plant and Equipment have been written off over their estimated useful lives on a straight line basis to calculate the depreciation charge for the period as follows:

Office Alterations 10 years

Office Equipment 2-5 years

Furniture & Fittings 2-15 years

Other Equipment 2-5 years

Uniforms

Uniforms are expensed at the time of purchase, unless purchased for future squads.

Interest in Joint Venture

The Joint Venture is a joint arrangement with other parties in which NNZ has several liability in respect of costs and liabilities, and shares in any resulting output. NNZ's share of the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses of the joint venture are incorporated into the financial statements on a line by line basis.

Taxation

NNZ is a non-profit body for taxation purposes under section CW 46 of the Income Tax Act 2007 and as such no taxation is payable on the profit for the year.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There has been no change in accounting policies during the year and they have been applied on a consistent basis.
